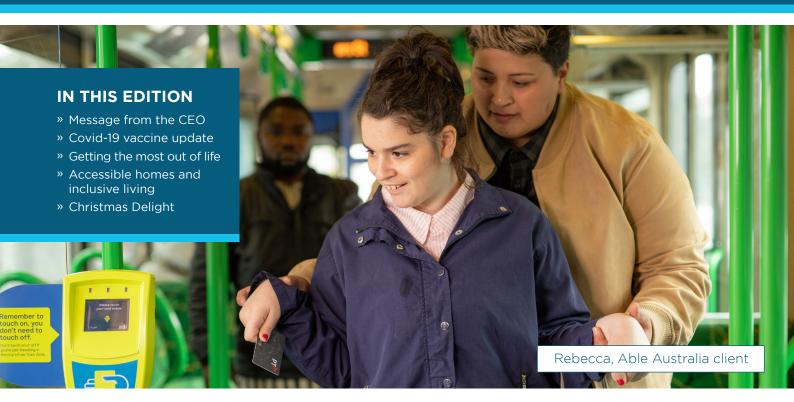

REBECCA SPREADS HER WINGS

This year, 23-year-old Rebecca celebrates five years attending a Day Service at Able Australia. Like many families, Rebecca and her parents were faced with the challenge of 'what next' when Rebecca graduated from her purpose built government specialist school. The options were limited. Rebecca and her parents wanted to find a service that would not just provide support but also an environment in which she would thrive - one well equipped to support individuals with multiple disabilities. On their search, they visited several Day Services.

When Rebecca came for her orientation visit to the Able Day Service in Victoria, she instantly felt at home. Rebecca walked straight in, as if she already knew the surroundings.

"We were happy to have found a place where Rebecca could meet new people and be surrounded with people her age; to safely spread her wings, to feel like her own person," said Mary, Rebecca's mum.

Having had such a positive start, the Able support team went to work, taking the time to better understand Rebecca, her needs and her goals. Today, Rebecca enjoys every interaction in the centre. She participates in the cooking experiences, music and art therapy sessions.

"Since joining Able Australia we have seen a marked improvement in Rebecca's confidence and independence," says Savva Agisilaou, Rebecca's father. Today, Rebecca takes great pride in practising a range of daily living skills including helping set the dinner table, putting her clothes in the laundry, keeping her drink bottle in the fridge and unpacking her bag.

While Rebecca is non-verbal, she has learned how to express herself and can communicate her wishes through non-verbal expression.

"What we like about Able is it's not one size fits all," says Mary. "There is a lot of tailored support and a big focus on development. They are always looking at new activities and opportunities to grow and stimulate Rebecca. My husband and I feel we have a great partnership with them in meeting our daughter's needs."

COVID UPDATE

Recently, the Australian Government announced that, people living with disability in residential settings and their workers would be among the first to be given access to a COVID-19 vaccination which commenced on 22 February 2021. Dianne

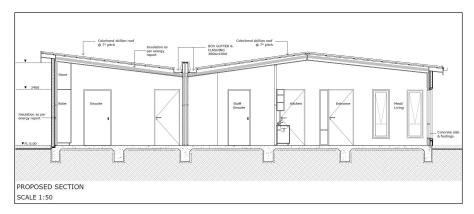
Dianne is a woman who receives supports from our Lifestyle Choices team five days per week.

Prior to the Covid Pandemic. Dianne would spend a lot of her time in our Centre in Moonah. Dianne enjoyed her routine of seeing her friends every day and spent a lot of her time doing puzzles, scrapbooking and having her nails done. Dianne has complex needs relating to sensory stimulation

and predictable routines and as such. Dianne has multiple chronic health conditions which places her at a high risk to Covid. Which means that, since the beginning of the pandemic, nearly 12 months ago, she has been unable to come in to the centre or to access the Community much at all. ACCESSIBLE HOMES & INCLUSIVE LIVING UPDATE





At Able, we believe in the importance of accessible living as an integral part of enhancing independence. We are excited about the three redevelopment projects that we have in the pipeline. These are projects that have been made possible, thanks to our incredible donors.

In late-2019 and mid-2020, we reached out to you with a request of raising \$600,000 to build twosingle unit homes in Moorabbin and to renovate the kitchen and bathroom in Springvale.

You will be pleased to know that, in November 2020, the Department of Health Services offered Able finance to renovate the kitchen and bathroom in Able's Springvale home. They have committed to creating an accessible kitchen and bathroom for our residents, which will enable us to achieve our goal of accessible living. This has also meant we only need to fund the Moorabbin build - a \$525,000 project.

Thanks to generous donations from supporters like you, we raised an astounding \$313,000 towards these dream projects in December 2019 and June 2020. The balance of this project, \$212,000 will be financed by Able Australia.

We would love the opportunity to show you the improvements we are making in the disability sector whilst focusing on the needs of the community at large. As we continue our journey, we extend our heartfelt thanks to you for being an integral part of our community.
