

Butterfly by Deb



Pastels and Watercolours by Richard

Richard is an innovative and creative young man who has explored many mediums in the art room. Richard is deafblind and tactile experiences are central to the creative process for him. Richard formed his own unique process of selecting materials with different textures that he liked and cutting them up into different shapes. He then spent time thoughtfully arranging them together almost like puzzle pieces, or a paper collage and then tacked them down with thumb tacks. He enjoyed running his hands over the different textures of material and the feel of the thumb tacks.

Team Able T-shirts

This year we hosted the first Able Games at our Able East day service in Melbourne in July, to coincide with the 2022 Commonwealth Games. The event was the first collaboration with our Northcote Day Service since resuming supports post Covid-19.

In preparation for the event, clients designed their own team jerseys choosing colours and designs which represented the fun and togetherness of the event. The 'team jerseys' were worn during the opening ceremony where clients made their way with handcrafted torches to the main games area. Clients participated in a variety of individual and team games including soccer, totem tennis and bocci to name a few. We closed the games with a medal ceremony and well deserved BBQ.



Trash and Treasure by Alex

Trash & Treasure is a fully tactile art piece using fabric, glitter and different shells to deliver a hands-on art piece.

This piece encourages those looking at this piece to close their eyes and use the sense of touch, and a rough idea of how a Deafblind artist creates art using hands rather than a paintbrush like I have been using over the years.

Woodwork by Sean

Sean has a keen interest in manual trades: carpentry, woodworking, plumbing and electrical. He has CHARGE syndrome and is vision and hearing impaired. In 2019, he was able to explore learning woodwork at Vision Australia's Woodworking Program for vision impaired. He completed Levels 1, 2 and 3 in just 12 months, instead of the usual 18 months. In 2020, he completed a Certificate II in Furniture making at TAFE. Over the past two years, he has been improving his skills and learning about the furniture making trade from a furniture maker in the community. Sean's goal now is to pursue an apprenticeship in furniture making and seek employment in the industry.







Woodwork by Steven

Steven has recently recommenced attending the Men's Bizz at the Rocherlea Shed. Steven was supported to source a couple of basic wood projects that he was keen to make for himself and family. The instructions were provided to the shed who then supplied the timber which Steven paid for. The wood was then cut to size.

With the support and assistance of both Able support staff and also staff and volunteers from the shed Steven then began the process of putting together.








Octopus Garden by Birribi clients

Creating the Octopus Garden was an immersive experience as clients were supported to go to the beach and gather the coral, seaweed, rocks, and shells to form the Octopus Garden. Clients were encouraged and actively supported by hand over hand to paint the coral and seaweed. Clients used modelling clay to shape and make the sea creatures and finished off with more painting and decorating along with the rocks and shells.




DRAWINGS AND EXPERIMENTAL ART: BIRRIBI



Making the clouds was a comprehensive process including purchasing tree lampshades from the local op shop and cable tying them together. Multi coloured stripes were added around the lampshades. Netting was added to keep everything around the lampshades in place. Adhesive spray was used to adhere the filler which is the white fluffy cloud like material to the lampshades. Rain drops which were purchased were added as well as handmade raindrops made from resin and attached to the cloud with fishing line. The finished art piece illuminates.



Soap by Lifestyle Choices South clients

Last year clients made baubles to give as a thank you to Able Australia donors. This year the team decided to make soaps to say thank you to some of Able Australia's donors. Each soap has an intricate design, and the scent is heavenly.









Candles by Lifestyle Choices South clients

A candle making machine was used to make the candles which was safe and easy for clients to use. Clients picked their design and added the mica colours. In the next step they turned the small valve on the machine which filled their glasses with their candle colours. Some moulds were used which replicated things like macarons and fruit. To make what looked like ice was unmelted wax chips with a drizzle of clear hot wax put over the candle to hold it together. Leftover scent from the soaps pictured has been used and the candles smell divine. Many clients found the candle making process quite simple, and the results - spectacular.

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
